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
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

An Overnight Success?

In 2008, when the global recession slowed work at my advertising/marketing agency, I decided—20 years after my husband first suggested it—to enrol in a two-year Masters program. At 51, I would learn how to write a novel.

At the same time, my mother and I were making frequent trips to Jaipur, where my brother had bought a condo. She shared so much about her girlhood during those trips, and it occurred to me that my mother, who had led such a conventional Indian life—arranged marriage, three children by 22, no career—had always encouraged me to make my own decisions about marriage, career and family. I decided to write a book for her, reimagining her life as Lakshmi, a henna artist, who defied society to forge a life of her own, much like the independent path India was charting after independence.

The Henna Artist became my Master's thesis. Within the next year, however, my mother died. Overwhelmed with grief, I stopped writing altogether.

A year later, my thesis advisor called to check up on me. When I told her about my mother, she suggested that working on the book could be good therapy and recommended some edits. She sent my revised manuscript to her agent Emma Sweeney, who loved it. And just like that, I had a literary agent!

I pictured myself signing books to a long line of readers, the way it happened in the movies. But Emma felt the manuscript needed work. She had me trim 140 pages—a painful task. She made another suggestion: hire a developmental editor. More rewrites? I cried.





My editor sent me 15 pages of extensive changes. What?? After seven years, I still had more work to do?

I stopped writing. Again.

A year later, I came across the manuscript. Curious, I started reading. Not bad, I thought and decided to take a second look at the editor's suggestions, make the changes.

Emma sold that final manuscript to MIRA Books, a division of Harper Collins—10 years and 30 drafts after I'd first conceived Lakshmi. A year later, MIRA bought the sequel, The Secret Keeper of Jaipur, before the first book appeared in stores.

I waited for my release date: March 10, 2020. On March 11, all hell broke loose! A global pandemic. My book launch: cancelled. Bookstores: closed. Libraries: closed. Amazon: only shipping essential supplies. What now?

Like a superhero, Reese Witherspoon to the rescue! She selected The Henna Artist as her May Bookclub pick!! More miracles: bookstores started shipping books; libraries arranged curbside pickups.

MY BOOK SHOT UP THE NEW YORK TIMES BESTSELLER LIST. MOVIE COMPANIES CALLED. I CHOSE THE MIRAMAX TEAM WITH FREIDA PINTO STARRING AS LAKSHMI.

To date, 'The Henna Artist' has been translated into 23 languages. I've joined more than 550 bookclub discussions around the world. Readers are loving The Secret Keeper of Jaipur, and I'm writing the third book in The Jaipur Trilogy.

So is there such a thing as an overnight success? Hmmm.



THE SECRET KEEPER OF JAIPUR

A NOVEL BY AUTHOR ALKA JOSHI

The Secret Keeper of Jaipur began with a scene. Nimmi, a young tribal woman, is arranging flora she has harvested from the upper elevations of the Himalayas at her stall on the Shimla Mall. Two young children are playing at her feet in a basket woven by her hand. In the distance, Malik, a former street child, now a 20-year-old boarding schooleducated young man, is leading his guardian Lakshmi to the stall because he knows Lakshmi will be interested in adding Nimmi's exotic plants to her Healing Garden in Shimla. Lakshmi notices the chemistry between Malik and Nimmi but doesn't approve of their alliance.

I knew then that Lakshmi would arrange for Malik to apprentice at the Palace in Jaipur. There, he would encounter characters from the first book, The Henna Artist: the successful Singhs, the Dowager Maharani and the younger queen, the Agarwals and their son Niki. And I knew Malik would unwittingly become party to an underworld smuggling scheme that would lead him right back to the mountains of Shimla, to his beloved Nimmi and to Lakshmi.

The Secret Keeper of Jaipur tackles the themes of parent-adult child relationships, the consequences of past actions, LGBTQ issues, and, as always in my novels, how South Asia's rich, ancient culture has contributed to world development.

The Secret Keeper of Jaipur, Prologue, Malik (1969, Jaipur)

It's May in Jaipur and already sweltering. The theatre is airconditioned, but the air outside is fresher than the odour of a thousand bodies pressed close together inside the theatre. Ravi's wife, Sheela, refuses the chai and the food, claiming it's too hot to eat. Her baby daughter has fallen asleep on her shoulder, the warmth of her small body making Sheela squirm. Sheela puffs out her cheeks and walks over to a stall selling khuskhus fans. A bead of sweat glides down her bare neck and disappears into the back of her blouse. I force myself to look away.

Parvati is proudly showing off her four-year-old granddaughter Rita to the society matrons who have come to say hello. "Tumara naam batao, bheti." Kanta is chatting gaily with friends. Samir and Manu are being congratulated for their work on the cinema house who have shown up for the gala affair. I look around for Ravi, who was with them earlier, and wonder why he would miss this opportunity to be in the limelight. It's not like him.

As always, I'm watching and listening, something Auntie-Boss taught me to do well. In my next letter to her and Nimmi in Shimla, I'll be able to tell them what the moviegoers thought of the leading lady's hairstyle or the color of her sari (I'll wager Nimmi has never seen a movie in her life!). I'll also be able to tell them that most of the ladies of Jaipur would marry the handsome Dev Anand given half a chance.

I see Sheela coming back to join our group, waving her fan in front of her face. Parvati reaches up to lift damp curls away from the sleeping baby's forehead. Sheela is looking past her mother-in-law. I follow her gaze to the corner of the cinema house. That's when I notice Ravi escorting the younger actress out the side door. Sheela's eyes narrow as her husband and the starlet disappear in the darkness, away from the throng. I know there's a loading dock there. It's also where the drivers for the maharani and the actors are waiting to whisk them away.

We hear the bell announcing that intermission is almost over. The second half of the film is about to begin. I check my watch. It's now 9:30 p.m. Sheela's girls should be in bed, but Ravi had insisted that the family be present and seen by the public at his big moment. I'm sure Sheela fought him on it. She prefers to have the ayah look after the girls. The crowd files back into the lobby and through the open doors of the theater. I hand the empty tea glasses to the chaiwallas making their rounds. Banana leaves on which chaat was sold litter the ground. A fragrance of food served and eaten— not wholly unpleasant —lingers in the air. I lift Rita, Ravi's other daughter, whose eyes have started to droop, and hoist her onto my shoulder.

I follow the rest of the group inside the lobby. Before we make it through the doors, we hear a yawning creak, then a complaining groan, and then suddenly the roar of a thousand pounds of cement, brick, rebar and drywall crashing down.

EXCLUSIVE INTERVIEW

WITH NEW YORK TIMES BEST-SELLING AUTHOR



01: What was your first thought when you started writing and when?

I'd never intended to be a writer. I always thought I'd be drawing, sketching or painting in some capacity. At 28, when I applied for my first job as an art director at an advertising agency, the Creative Directors asked me to join their team as a writer; they said my portfolio clearly showed I was a strong writer. Surprised but determined to eventually secure an art director position, I accepted. As it turned out, I loved writing commercials—those amazing, entertaining mini-stories taking place in 60 seconds or less. I was building characters and scenes, writing dialogue, and developing a beginning, middle, and end to each story. With my art background, it was easy to create those worlds in my imagination. But it would be many decades before I would enrol in a Masters program in Creative Writing and many more years—not until the age of 62—before I would publish my first novel, The Henna Artist.

02: Does writing energize or exhaust you?

I'm never more energized than when I'm in the midst of a scene, working with characters as if I were the director of production. I allow the scene to play itself out in my imagination. I move characters around—like chess pieces —and instruct them to try being less angry or more playful. Then I sit back and let the drama unfold. In this way, I get to know the characters so intimately that they begin to say and do things that completely surprise me. When that happens, I'm on cloud nine! Being able to give characters the freedom to reveal themselves is one of the greatest joys of being a writer. It's also the reason I ended up writing a trilogy. The characters insisted I write the rest of their story, not merely stop at the happy ending. How they grow into their personalities, how their relationships with one another change—this is what inspires and engages me in what is ultimately their story.

03: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

I could write a book about all the mistakes I made as a beginning writer! To start with, I thought I was done after my first draft. Then I thought my second draft was the final. What about my seventh draft? In the end, it took me 30 drafts to learn how to craft a novel. Writing is about rewriting—why didn't they teach that in my MFA program? Most writers stop too soon and then are disappointed when their work doesn't find a publisher.

Another trap is that an aspiring writer will focus more on getting published than on why they're writing. Every writer should ask themselves: why am I writing this story? Why now? Why am I the best person to write it? By keeping that intention as the main focus, a writer can

maintain her true north. If she has a deeply personal reason for delving into her project, that intention will resonate with readers in a visceral way.

Yet another reason aspiring writers get discouraged is thinking that the world will discover their true talent without their active participation. Many writers, most of whom are introverts, prefer to remain in the shadows after their work finds a publishing home. They think: if my work is good enough, people will find it. But why a writer chose their subject matter and how they talk about it incites readers to pick up their books. Writing is only half the work of getting the book into readers' hands.

04: What is your writing Kryptonite?

Because I started life as an artist (an introverted one), I learned to observe my surroundings in detail. After all, you can't draw a leaf without noticing its every vein, the changes in hue from its tip to where it attaches to the branch, whether the edges are ragged or smooth. In the same way, I learned to watch people: the way they interact with one another, what they say, what I can feel them thinking, and what they don't say. I also paid attention to whether there was a hum in the air or the crow of a rooster, whether I could smell freshly cut grass or the stink of an overripe banana, whether it was muggy or whether the breeze was making goosebumps rise on my skin. It's that sensory input and my ability to put it into words that produces my literary juice.

05: Have you ever gotten writer's block?

Maddeningly, no. Everything inspires me to create stories: a conversation with a stranger at the supermarket, the scent of my shampoo, garlic wafting from a neighbour's kitchen, music from my husband's CDs, my dogs digging in the sand—literally everything!

O6: Did you ever consider writing under a pseudonym?

No.

07: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?

I write the stories I want to read. I like reading about strong women, so my stories always have formidable personalities—women who are determined and persistent in their intentions. I like reading about real people, with all their strengths and weaknesses, joys and sorrows, triumphs and defeats. So I create imperfect characters, leaving room to develop and transform. I love historical fiction because our past determines our future and I'm curious about how we came to be. I love researching history to lend authenticity to my fiction.



Another paramount issue for me as a writer is that for so long, stories about South Asians have been told from the Western perspective, the point of view of the colonizers. I want to tell these stories from a South Asian lens, which is such a vital part of my DNA: the subtle nuances of culture, its fragrant flora and food, its class and caste divides, the intricate familial relationships, the depth of knowledge and wisdom accumulated over millennia. My intention is to show how life was (and is) actually lived in South Asia, the real story behind why India needed to rebuild itself after being ravaged by the British, the subtle and not-so-subtle ways patriarchy keeps women from achieving equality, and the continual struggle to preserve ancient tradition while incorporating modern modalities.

08: Do you think someone could be a writer if they don't feel emotions strongly?

I think it would be difficult to write well-developed characters without being able to feel their emotions in any given situation. Whether we're writing science fiction or mystery or historical fiction, it's our ability to write characters readers can empathize with on an emotional level that marks the bestseller from the average book. The story is key, but the characters are king (and queen)!

09: How did publishing your first book change your process of writing?

Publishing The Henna Artist didn't change my writing process in any way. I still write in my pyjamas in bed. It's where I feel the most comfortable. My dogs are sleeping beside me. My husband is off cycling or writing in his own studio. I never attempt to write on a blank page. By the time I start, I've been processing scenes and characters in my imagination for months as I walked, rode my bike, took a shower or drove my car. The only thing that changed is how long it takes me to write the final draft. The Henna Artist took 10 years; The Secret Keeper of Jaipur and the third book I'm currently writing in the trilogy are only taking two years each. I'm writing about the same characters so I don't have to reinvent their likes, dislikes, or quirks of personality. I already know how they'll react in any situation.

10: How many unpublished and half-finished books do you have?

I had started researching a new novel right after *The Henna Artist* was sent to the printers. I hadn't gotten very far before 20-year-old Malik insisted I write The Secret Keeper of Jaipur. He had grown into such a strong character in the first book that he would not leave my imagination. Six months after I began writing his story, *The Henna Artist* was released and I discovered, much to my amazement, that readers wanted to know more about Malik as well. He must have loomed large in their imagination, too!

11: What does literary success look like to you?

Literary success means I make a living as a full-time author. I have the privilege of creating stories and using my imagination for the rest of my days on this planet. And I have the honour of interacting with passionate readers who find comfort, inspiration, and courage in my story and my characters—it feels as if they are a part of my amazing tribe!

12: What's the best way to market your books?

I've learned about marketing my books through experience. You and your publisher will collaborate on some of them; others will be completely up to you; the best methods will arise from trial and error. Before your book's release, traditional publishers will set up a few media interviews for you and send a press release to local, regional and national media outlets they feel are appropriate. They'll follow up with a few of those outlets which they feel are the most promising for features or book reviews. If pre-orders for the book are strong, the publisher will step up their promotional efforts on trade media like Goodreads or Bookbub.

Social media is your promotional playground, so be proactive. You can post about your subject matter, your research, your inspiration, anything that relates to you! Try all the platforms, pay for promotional ads, and look at the analytics to determine which are best for you. You need to interact with your readers by responding to their messages, questions, and requests to meet with you virtually. They took the time to buy your book; now it's your turn to return the favour by giving them some of your time.

12: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

My research and world-building go hand-in-hand. The research is threefold: reading books, watching movies and documentaries, and interviewing people who lived in the period I'm writing about. For The Secret Keeper of Jaipur, I found fantastic articles about the nomadic tribes of the Himalayas and their knowledge of medicinal herbs, India's Gold Control Act, and how gold is smuggled into South Asia. Sheep shearing videos on YouTube filled the gaps in my knowledge about the Himalayan shepherds. My father, who worked as a civil engineer in Rajasthan in the 50s and 60s, enlightened me about construction/engineering issues that could cause a building like the fictional Royal Jewel Cinema to collapse. (Eerily enough, the launch date of the novel in America was two days before the Miami condo complex collapsed.)

13: How do you feel about being featured on the front cover of DE MODE?

DE MODE is a high quality, professionally produced arts and culture magazine. I'm deeply honoured to be featured on its front cover as a writer who is bringing stories of the rich South heritage to the global stage, to highlight how much the East has contributed to the West, to spotlight the resilience of our people—especially the women—in the face of centuries of colonization, invasion and domination by other forces.

THE GUARDIAN OF THE PALACE

BY AUTHOR STEVEN J. MORRIS

The Guardian of The Palace sits at the crossroads of Science Fiction and Fantasy, and several reviewers have thrown it into the bucket of Thriller. While the author did not intend the latter, suspenseful elements might have crept in through withered and warped door frames, through broken drain pipes, and around the guards meant to keep them out.

Book one of the four-book series, The Guardian League, follows "Red" Hernandez, a woman recently returning to civilian life after a shady stint in the military. Her experience lands her a job protecting a modern-day marvel of a building just as it enters a disputed Phase Two of its construction. While she had no illusions that the job would be easy, she expected her skills in unclogging log-jams in high-pressure military missions to enable the on-time completion of the engineering feat that the public had lovingly dubbed The Palace.

Author Morris begins Chapter 1 by dropping you smack into "Sunday, the day after the attack," and then jumps between past and present to unravel the tangle of how Red ended up questioning her own beliefs about reality. Then the book marches you forward through science, magic, and adventure-filled mayhem. The chapters fly by, craftily teasing you to peek just a little into the next chapter until you've gone too far and might as well just keep going. Surely the end of this chapter will be a good stopping point! But alas, just a tiny peek more. Book one ends with a bang and a cliffhanger that leaves you eager for more. Add this one to your To Be Read list, and be ready for your fantasy/sci-fi/thriller adventure.

THE JOURNEY OF AUTHOR STEVEN MORRIS

Steven J. Morris spends most of his day designing microchips for Intel Corp. With a PhD in Electrical Engineering, he has worked in multiple roles at Intel over the years, from transistor design to CAD tool

creation, to chip creation, switching between the roles of an individual contributor and manager several times. During his career, he has tackled various external efforts - shareware game creation, starting a family, house construction, creating gadgets for the maker revolution, and most recently, writing.

Steve picked writing up after a confluence of events several years prior - a shift at work provided an opportunity, and a retired friend had just written a book. His friend's self-

published book reminded Steve of his desire, some thirty years before, to write a book. On a five-hour car ride one Easter weekend, he tried to pick up the elements of his long-abandoned story, and think them through. By the end of the ride, he decided the story was at least viable—thirty years provides a great deal of insight and experience. He wouldn't

recommend waiting that long to others wanting to write... but some wines need thirty years!

Morris's journey down the path of a writer brought him to the steps of an editor, Marla Taviano, who took on the role of writing coach, editor, and friend. And out of Steven's idea, and Marla's patience and feedback, The Guardian League came to life. Book 1, 'The Guardian of The Palace', came out in January of 2021. Book 2, 'Stars in the Sand' arrived in June.



Rough drafts of the four-book series existed before the first book appeared on virtual shelves, but it took him months to get each one ready to see the light of day.

INTERVIEW WITH AUTHOR steven morris

Q: Is writing your passion or emotion?

Passion, though I hope I have captured a lot of emotion in the writing. I've never felt so much like I'm doing what I was meant to be doing as when I'm writing. But I've definitely laughed, gotten angry, and even shed tears over my characters as I created their stories—I do hope that comes through.

Q: What was that final or provoking thought that made you write your first book?

My buddy, Rafael Rios, wrote a book after retiring from Intel. Thirty years ago, I had been passionate about the idea of writing the story I had in me, but I couldn't do it then, and I'd let it scab over, then scar, until it was all but a tattoo I'd forgotten. When Rafael wrote his book... an alarm went off, awakening me.

Q: How does writing bring out the best in you?

It makes me think more, in odd ways, experience more, even if it is just through the head of a character in my own mind. It helps me relate to other people better, and, bottom-line, it makes me feel better.

Q: Do you believe in awards or rewards?

Tough one and I don't have a good answer. When I'm in a good frame of mind, writing is its own reward, and nothing else is needed. But I write because I like creating worlds, and I read because I like seeing the worlds others create—if I don't have any feedback that others enjoy my worlds, then I'm not sure I've achieved what I set out to do. That sounds a lot like awards to me. So I know what I'd like my answer to be, and I know it isn't quite true.

Q: What is your favorite Quote?

I know I'm supposed to say something profound, revealing what an insightful person I am, but the quote that pops in my head when asked is this bit from Real Genius:

Mitch: "What are you doing?" Chris: "Self-realization. I was thinking of the immortal words of Socrates, who said, ' . . . I drank what?'"

Asking how does it make your favourite quote, he said "I will say, having some reviewers quote my own writing has been more thrilling than I expected, but my ego would never allow my favourite quote to come from myself."

Q: How does writing inspire you the most?

Writing is weird. There's a point, where the brilliant idea in your head is so inspiring that it is maddening. Then you write it down. And it's crap. Total junk. And you stare internally at the thing in your head and read the thing on your phone/computer/paper, and you wonder what the hell went wrong. And then you coax the words, drawing the timid things out from their hiding places until you have something passable. Then you come back to it and remould it into something even better.

There's a lot of inspiring moments in there, but it is the sweat and tears (I don't think I've literally bled, fingers raw from typing, yet) that you put in to get you through the trials that are ultimately the most inspiring.

Q: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?

A mix. When I read, I want to see original world-building, but believable characters, so that's what I strive to deliver.

Q: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

Thinking it will be easy. Giving up when it's not.

Thinking you just need to write the thing in your head and you're done. You're not.

Doubting yourself. Being afraid of what the world thinks. It's good to have friends help you through. To remind you to just keep swimming.

Q: For you what is the meaning of being a writer?

World creation and believable characters—the combo needs to draw the reader into another world, and let them see things through someone else's eyes.

Q: How do you feel being an author?

Inadequate, but love trying!

Q: Do you have any upcoming book? What is it about?

This article was about Book 1 of The Guardian League: The Guardian of The Palace, which came out in Jan 2021. Book 2 recently arrived—June 15, 2021. Book 3 is pencilled in for December 2021, but not being an expert in book gestation (yet), maybe it is due Jan 2022.

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a hook?

I don't let a lack of research hinder me from starting a book. Sometimes I just want to get the idea jotted down. Then go do the research and reshape it. But I'll tell you this: one of the books I used for research in my first book, The Writer's Guide to Weapons, has a great quote: "Figure out what you need to know more about, see how it works, throw it into the story, and be done with it." He meant it to be a practical statement about not overthinking firearms and knives, but I think it applies more broadly.

Q: How do you feel about your book being featured in DE MODE?

Excited! Self-promotion is not my thing. I think, unless you are an extroverted business promoter who sat down and wrote a book, writers generally do not enjoy pushing their own work. An opportunity like DE MODE comes like a breath of fresh air.

As her past and present collide, Kate is dragged into the middle of a dangerous game where only one thing is clear—no one can be trusted.

Q: What was that final or provoking thought that made you write your first book?

The inspiration for my first book, and ultimately for all of my writing, was to showcase women in a realistic way. Women are strong and resilient, but they are also human and fallible. I wanted readers to see themselves in my characters

Q: Is writing your passion or emotion?

Both. I write because I love to do it. I am driven to do it. But I also write from a place of deep emotion and compassion for the world we live in and people suffering from interpersonal violence.

Q: Do you believe in awards or rewards?

Both. I think people should be fairly compensated for the work that they do, and I believe that recognition for extraordinary effort or performance is also appropriate. As an author, I want to be paid for my work but I also strive to create a quality product, one that will stand out from the crowd so recognition is always appreciated.

Q: How does writing bring out the best in you?

Writing allows me to help people by shedding light on real social issues like interpersonal violence, addiction, and even things like juggling a career and motherhood. Knowing that even one person might feel less alone in the world brings out the best in me.

Q: What is your favorite Quote?

"Fight for the things that you care about, but do it in a way that will lead others to join you." Ruth Bader Ginsberg was a hero of mine. The way she lived her life and the way she did her work was in perfect harmony. That's my hope for my own life and work.

Q: How does writing inspire you the most?

I love hearing people's stories. The good and the bad. It's sometimes heartbreaking, but more often than not I see love, resilience, strength and community. I see families torn apart by violence finding ways to come back together and support one another. There is injustice, but there is also so much hope.

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

I read voraciously, which influences what I write, and I do a large amount of Internet research prior to writing and throughout the process. Most importantly, if I can, I visit the settings I am writing in because the details of a place make it come alive for readers—and immersing myself in a place helps me see those details first-hand.

Q: How do you feel being an author?

I feel free.

Q: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?

I don't think you can be successful in this industry without considering what readers want and practical issues like genre expectations and the market. That being said, it's important to develop a unique voice. That's what makes an author original.

Q: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

Aspiring writers tend to put all their faith in the advice of more experienced writers. They haven't had time to build confidence in their own writing, so they make decisions based on other people's journeys. My advice to all writers is to look honestly at your situation, your goals, and your dreams and create a path forward based on them.

Q: For you what is the meaning of being a writer?

Being a writer for me is storytelling with a focus on social justice. It's a chance to entertain and inform and it allows me the flexibility to live my life the way I want to.

Q: Do you think someone could be a writer if they don't feel emotions strongly?

Because I feel emotions strongly, it's hard to imagine writing without that but people experience the world in their own unique ways so who am I to say whether a less emotional person can write or not.

Q: How can you bring change in the literature world?

I think change comes from being confident in my work whether it conforms to mainstream industry expectations or not. By telling the story that I want to tell, I hope to change the way readers think about the world and to change their expectations of what fiction looks like.

Q: Do you have any upcoming book? What is it about?

I am currently working on the second book in my A Legacy of Silence series where I will continue exploring the lives of my main character Kate and her sister Tilly amidst the unravelling of a small-town sex trafficking operation.

Q: How do you feel about your book being featured in DE MODE?

REDEMPTIVE TRAUMA

CONFESSION OF A DEFROCKED PRIEST

BY AUTHOR DAVID GIFFEN

David Giffen was once a defrocked priest. Having spent a decade as an Anglican cleric in Southwestern Ontario, David served in leadership in three urban social-justice focused appointments as a priest in the Anglican Church of Canada. David was deprived of ministry and terminated from his appointment as an incumbent priest of his parish on December 12th, 2018. He was in his fourth month on medical leave. David was formally accused, investigated and found guilty of sexual misconduct, all while he was drugged out, melting down on social media.

As someone working to heal from traumatic stress injuries from childhood, David's diagnosis with Complex Post Traumatic Stress Disorder in 2018 led him to become a public advocate for the de-stigmatization of mental health and addiction issues (especially when related to generational trauma). He quickly learned the challenges and opportunities this presents, as he himself is one of the examples. Redemptive Trauma: Confession of a Defrocked Priest is a memoir embracing hard truths of trauma to help others heal their own.

David holds both a Bachelor's and Master's degree from Huron University College at the Western University in London, Ontario. For most of his adult life, David served as a street-involved pastor in Toronto and London. His major focuses of ministry were related to social outreach, restorative justice, and learning to wrestle with life and faith in the rapidly evolving social media age.

The author is almost certain that if you don't like stories about sex, drugs, rock stars, alcohol, and the uneven rise and fall of the guilty and the innocent, you probably won't like the Bible either. Or this book. Otherwise, go ahead, dig into both.

David works with executives, academics, groups and businesses – anyone who has found themselves or their organizations in a place that requires support and guidance to plan the best


steps to achieve a stated objective, all the way to working through transformative change.


founder of 403 Leadership Collective & the Co-Founder of The F.O.C.U.S. Movement.

INTERVIEW WITH AUTHOR david giffen

Q: Is writing your passion or emotion?

Writing is an extension of thought and reflection for me, both passion and emotion. I have been writing and public speaking since I was a little child, then as a student, preacher, blogger and author. I am not sure my life makes much sense without writing. There are times when I must write before my passions and emotions will make much sense to me.

Q: What was that final or provoking thought that made you write your first book?

This was my first book. I woke up after another meaningless night of drug use and alcohol consumption, looked in the mirror and asked myself if I could live with my son never really knowing who I am. I did not necessarily know my writing would lead to the popular published memoir it is today, but I wrote full time for almost three weeks straight after that treacherous morning. I poured out my story over the broken parts of my existence and saw how through it, I could be made whole.

Q: Do you believe in awards or rewards?

I believe in both. I think awards are an opportunity to acknowledge excellence among us (I was never big on participation ribbons). I think rewards are earned by hard work and dedication to one's craft. But ultimately, as I outline in my book, I believe in grace, mercy, and love, above all else. Deserve and earn can often be antithetical to the first two, and at its best, maybe even the third.

Q: What is your favorite Quote?

"I refuse to be a role model.

I set goals, take control, drink out my own bottles.

I make mistakes but learn from everyone;

And when it's said and done, I bet this brother be a better one.

If I upset you, don't stress,

Never forget that God isn't finished with me yet."

- Tupac Amaru Shakur (Also the final words of my book)

Q: How does writing bring out the best in you?

It does not always. Sometimes it brings out dark and twisty sides of me.

Q: How do you feel being an author?

I am not sure I am used to it yet. It has been less than a year since my book debuted at #1 on Amazon Canada. I feel blessed to have been given the opportunity to share my story with the world.

Q: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

Believing that they will have more time later to finish their work. Now is the time.

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how

long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

My first book is a memoir; a eulogy to both the first half of my life and my life as an ordained Anglican priest. The research was intensive therapy and working with others suffering from trauma disorders. It is a book about male vulnerability and learning the deep value of empathy while tackling mental health and the associated stigma, which often buries those who suffer. I tell stories about sex, drugs, alcohol and abuse, through the lens of grace, mercy and love. I spent a lifetime preparing for this one... I hope the next will not require quite the same.

Q: How do you feel about your book being featured in DE MODE?

Excited! It is a great honour.

Q: How does writing inspire you the most?

I get inspired by everything around me, people, art, music, relationships, politics, books, observations, conversations, debates, cultures, films, religions and moments. Injustice, entitlement and abuse make my blood boil which inspires significant parts of my more dark writing.

Q: What was that final or provoking thought that made you write your first book?

Ever since I can remember, new stories are shaping in my head daily. So it's the actual story that makes me write. When I was four years old, I wrote my first book - one edition and one copy only but with a great thought - The birthday party.

Q: Do you believe in awards or rewards?

Rewards - Nothing makes me so happy when one of your readers rewards other authors or me with their review - that is an example of something meaningful and rewarding.

Q: How does writing bring out the best in you?

I am not so sure it does. It might bring out a good book, but my personality is not great when I am writing. It's hard to focus on other things when you are totally engrossed in your story and characters. As a business owner and a single mum, this state of mind is not ideal.

Q: Is writing your passion or emotion?

Creating a story is my passion, and my words, meaning and thoughts are full of emotion, so for me, it's impossible to choose between the two.

Q: What is your favorite Quote?

One of my favourite book quotes is from Paulo Coelho's most famous book, The Alchemist: "There is only one thing that makes a dream impossible to achieve: the fear of failure."

Q: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

Thinking that you will one day wake up and believe that your manuscript is perfect, that will probably never happen. It took me over eight years of writing to get my act together and publish the first book in the series. So draw the line at some point and give your book to your editor.

Q: How do you feel being an author?

I feel proud, relieved, excited, and scared at the same time. Some of the topics I write about can be triggering and perhaps difficult to digest for some of my readers but for me, it's essential to write fiction that includes elements of our reality and our future around the corner, even if it's frightening.

Q: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?

I am not trying either; I am simply writing the stories down from my vivid mind and hoping that people will enjoy them. But, judging from my reader's reviews, I think it's fair to say that my writing style and the actual story are both original.

Q: For you what is the meaning of being a writer?

Writing is my way to share my thoughts and stories with

Q: Do you have any upcoming book? What is it about?

Yes, my newest book is called: The Battle of the Crying Minds, which should be out by the time this magazine is published. This is the third book in the Crying Minds series - following on from the first two books, The Secret of the Crying Minds, and the Hunt of the Crying Minds.

Q: What was that final or provoking thought that made you write your first book?

I have always loved to write. Before books, I wrote a column for one of Europe's leading martial arts magazines. It wasn't so much one final thought that pushed me to begin writing books but more of an inevitable evolution. It makes sense to do more of what I love.

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

I write both non-fiction and fiction and each title dictates what kind and how much research I do. I know some writers research relentlessly beforehand but I prefer to get on and write and fill in my gaps in knowledge as I go along. I'll do as much research as I need to make the work complete.

Q: Do you believe in awards or rewards?

Awards can be a double-edged sword. I'm not going to lie: when I won my book award it felt amazing, but I think it's a dangerous thing to 'chase acclaim'. Do your work because you love it and then see what happens when it enters the 'wide world'. If it wins something: fine. If it doesn't: fine.

Q: How does writing bring out the best in you?

I love that I am free to express myself. I love that sometimes I have to wrestle with ideas and sometimes they flow through me like I had nothing to do with the process. I love the idea that my work may bring a smile to a reader's lips, a tear to their eye or the light of hope to their heart.

Q: What is your favorite Quote?

"I learned that courage was not the absence of fear, but the triumph over it...The brave man is not he who does not feel afraid, but he who conquers that fear." - Nelson Mandela.

Q: How does writing inspire you the most?

I love that I am free to express myself. I love that sometimes I have to wrestle with ideas and sometimes they flow through me like I had nothing to do with the process. I love the idea that my work may bring a smile to a reader's lips, a tear to their eye or the light of hope to their heart.

Q: Is writing your passion or emotion?

My whole life is based on the concept of waking up and being delighted about the prospect of the day ahead. I have always believed that we should love what work we do and expect it to pay the bills. I have many passions, and writing is most certainly one of them. It's why I now write full time.

Q: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

The biggest is not sitting down and writing. People do this for two reasons: One- they are more interested in the 'fame' than the writing and so when an inevitable hurdle comes, they don't have the love to overcome it; two- they are frightened that what they write won't be any good. Just write. You'll get good eventually.

Q: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?

I don't 'try' to be anything. I say what I want to say and how I want to say it. Of course, I'm mindful of my audience but I don't contrive my work to fit a certain need. I believe in the saying: "Build it and they will come"

Q: For you what is the meaning of being a writer?

To express yourself as best you can and, maybe, in doing so, to connect with someone who was trying to say the same but couldn't yet find the words.

Q: Do you think someone could be a writer if they don't feel emotions strongly?

Hmmm. Another good question. I do think that one writes better work the deeper they delve. That said, we can only start from where we are. If you really want to write but don't yet feel strong emotions, don't worry. Write anyway. The emotions will come as you open up. Writing is a process, not an event.

Q: How can you bring change to the literature world?

I'd like for my work to bring 'big question' topics to people who ordinarily wouldn't have thought about them. For example, with my current work in progress (a novel) I deal with the concept of 'mind over matter' medicine. I've made it fiction so that those who might ordinarily laugh at such an idea can now engage.

Q: How do you feel being an author?

I cannot express how much I love it. I love the study of story craft, discovering ideas, writing them down, editing, rewriting, hearing my agent and publishers thoughts, watching my books be 'born', chatting with readers, doing interviews. I love the freedom to do what I love.

Q: Do you have any upcoming book?

I've currently just finished my debut novel, '21st Century Boy'. Here's the 'elevator pitch' - When teenager Sammy Martin learns to use his mind to heal, little does he expect that the biggest obstacle to curing his mother's cancer isn't the disease itself, but his older brother.

Q: How do you feel about your book being featured in DE MODE?

I'm actually really excited because my wife has been a fan and follower of DE MODE for a long time. At last, she might be impressed with me. :)

A documenter of truth in the guise of a story (for fiction writers at least).

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

I do a lot of research because it naturally strengthens the book. I've written about fishermen in Alaska, Wall Street executives, cult leaders, a teen grunge girl, and a stalker in the reality TV world – all were based on a good amount of research.

I love it. It's been my dream career since I was kid. It's not only what I'm meant to do with my life, it's the only career I really can do.



Q: What was that final or provoking thought that made you write your first book?

I did not like where the book I was currently reading was going. I did feel strongly that the author didn't take it to a satisfying conclusion. I wanted to change that. The first-year writing was an experiment—to see if I could do it and did enjoy the process. I did and now I have written 6 books, the first published. Each one brings me joy and makes challenges me to be a better writer.

Q: Do you believe in awards or rewards?

Yes, to both. I haven't had any for writing, other than monetary of course. But I do have friends that have written beautiful stories and have gotten awards. I do like the feeling of having achieved something at work and receiving a reward. I look forward to that possibility in the future.

Q: How does writing bring out the best in you?

I think that I have more self-confidence. So many people have gone out of their way to read it and I think that is lovely. I feel like I have something to say that people want to read. I also don't feel locked into my job any longer. I can see a future outside of it.

Q: What is your favorite Quote?

Betty Smith a tree grows in Brooklyn. "Frances Counted the year's passing into by the months but the by holidays that came along." The quote brings thought of my father who worked so hard for his family and dreamed about the next holiday when he could spend time with us.

Q: How does writing inspire you the most?

Perseverance-just keep going or as Dory says, "Just keep swimming." I just move to the next book the next project. I don't stop. It gives me something to look forward to after a long day examining drawing at work. It also gives me a sense of what I would say when someone asked me, what will you be doing in five or ten years.

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

Historical fiction requires lots of research but in my current book series: Notebook Mysteries I spent about 2-3 months getting the background. Once the world was created, I didn't have to put so much time in. For new books, the research can take longer. It can be 3-4 months if I need to order books.

Q: How do you feel being an author?

I feel proud of my accomplishment and happy that others enjoy reading my book. When my book was published in March-it was both parts thrilling and surreal. Did I really get done? Another was when people I didn't know bout the book and liked it. I continue to be nervous as I finish a

book and it moves to edit. I worry about the stories and if I have said enough, been though with my thoughts.

Q: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?

I let the stories guide me, sometimes I don't always agree with where I am headed but I follow it out. Original? I hope so, you strive for something different each time you write. I think that each book makes me a better writer.

Q: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

There is more than one way to be published. I think the trick is to make sure you do it professionally. This would be with cover designers, editors and beta readers. And don't live in a vacuum, continue to read other author's work and learn.

Q: For you what is the meaning of being a writer?

I have learned through this process is that anyone with a pen to paper is a writer. The act of writing is such a challenge, putting something out there in the public, hoping that they enjoy it. It does expose me to the public in a way that is scary. So, I would say the meaning of being a writer is to be brave enough to have others read your work.

Q: Do you think someone could be a writer if they don't feel emotions strongly?

I do not, all writing is about sharing everything, you can construct a story in different ways. I am not a person that has strong emotions, but I can construct an interesting story. Not everything has to be felt, some writers are like this and I think that's amazing, but it isn't me.

Q: How can you bring change in the literature world?

I don't think I can bring change, at least not now. Right now, I want to work with my categories—young adult and historical fiction. I am getting to know my genre and the authors in it. I think change will occur with experience when I am more willing to ask myself harder questions about my characters.

Q: Do you have any upcoming book? What is it about?

Notebook Mysteries ~ Decisions and Possibilities. It is set two years after book 1. I have written 5 so far in the series and will release two a year. Set in 1883, it is book two in my 'Notebook Mysteries' series.

Q: How do you feel about your book being featured in DE MODE?

It is wonderful to be asked. As a beginning author, I like to know people are interested in me and my books. I hope to share more.

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?



Q: Is writing your passion or emotion?

I believe it is both. The writing needs to be passionate about the idea of the book and the plot. I believe that the author must passionately believe in what he is writing. Equally important is the need to have emotion for the characters in the book to bring them alive. I also believe that passion and emotion must be tempered with the reason for the writing to come out well.

Q: What was that final or provoking thought that made you write your first book?

The writer in me was kindled from the school days. The path to the completion of the first book has been lined with a number of novels in the making abandoned after a few pages. The first book in writing took four years and about 3600 man writing hours to complete.

Q: How does writing bring out the best in you?

Writing is an intense process. It is passionate and emotive and at times the boundless passion makes you feel the dangers of the characters in the novel. Then you take a break and apply reason to temper what you have written. The writing takes you to a world that you create and you feel the pain, joy and ecstasy of the characters in the novel. It is a momentous feeling once you complete the book.

Q: Do you believe in awards or rewards?

I believe in awards and rewards. Awards in the literary field is a welcome recognition of your efforts and talent. Though I believe that the satisfaction of being able to write a novel that is appreciated by the readers is the biggest reward.

Q: How can you bring change in the literature world?

Q: For you what is the meaning of being a writer?

To me being a writer means being passionate about what you write and being able to make the characters come live to the reader. Most importantly to be clear in your mind as to why you are writing what you are writing.

Q: How do you feel being an author?

It is a fantastic feeling to know that your creation has come live as a book

- Allowing one's prejudices and biases to reflect in the writing
- Not being widely read and not doing enough research
- Limiting the scope of writing to one's horizon
- Pursuing cliché plot lines for sales
- Not getting a beta reading done and taking feedbacks.

Q: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?

I Believe in what I write and, tell the story in my style.

Q: Do you think someone could be a writer if they don't feel emotions strongly?

I think it would be very difficult for someone to be a writer if they do not feel emotions. The writing would fail to inspire a reader and fall flat if it acks the emotive energy. It is always the emotion that creates the connection and brings the character alive.

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

I believe that any and every aspect of the book should be well researched. The research consumes a major part of my writing time. My first book Men and Dreams in the Dhauladhar took me 4 years and 3600 man writing hours. More than half of the time was spent researching.

Q: How do you feel about your book being featured in DE MODE?

Q: Is writing your passion or emotion?

Writing is a passion of mine and I also find that it is a way to work through some emotions. When I was writing Happiness Solved, it was very therapeutic.

Q: What was that final or provoking thought that made you write your first book?

My first book was a novel for teenagers and was inspired by a former figure skating student of mine. She came on vacation with us to watch my then two-year-old son. She told me about how she was heading down the wrong path when she was 15 years old and when I shared with her my experience with drug abuse, it changed her life and she got back on the right track. This inspired me to write a novel to help teenagers see the world differently.

Q: How does writing bring out the best in you?

Writing brings out the best in me because I am so passionate about helping people and enjoy sharing my story to inspire others.

Q: Do you believe in awards or rewards?

Yes, I do believe in awards to acknowledge one's accomplishments. It was such an honour for me to be the finalist in two book awards. There is so much competition in book awards, so to actually be a finalist or a winner is a big accomplishment.

Q: How does writing inspire you the most?

When I am writing, it is inspiring to me because I consider myself a writer that is inspired to write. I do not just sit down and start writing. So when I am inspired to write, that is what drives me.

Q: For you what is the meaning of being a writer?

For me, the meaning of a writer is anyone who is able to write something that is inspiring to them. I do not believe that you have to be published to be considered a writer. There are many types of writers, not all are published.

Q: What is your favorite Quote?

My favourite quote is "Peace. It is not about being in a place where there is no noise, trouble, or hard work. It's about being in the midst of those things and still be calm in your heart." Author unknown.

Q: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

I think a common trap for aspiring writers is the belief that they have to be published by a big publishing company. Self-publishing is easier than ever these days.

Q: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?

When I am writing a self-improvement book, I try to be more original. When I am writing a novel, I try to keep it relevant so as to appeal to more readers.

Q: How can you bring change in the literature world?

That is a question that I have never considered. I feel as though since I have only published two books, I feel like more of an amateur in the literature world.

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

I generally research as I'm writing. I am working on a new self-improvement book and have been doing research on it prior to starting to write. I conducted a survey and have been researching the topic.

Q: Do you have any upcoming book? What is it about?

I will have at least two more books coming out in the next two years. One will be a self-improvement book which I have not named. The other one will be the second and third parts of my award-winning novel that was released in 2009. It was supposed to be a series and then my publisher went out of business. The second book in the series was finished in 2010. I am combing the first two books and finishing them. I have not decided on the title at this point.



INTERVIEW with AUTHOR alan bayles

Q: Is writing your passion or emotion?

It is my passion. It is my belief to be a writer you need to be passionate and care about what you write. It also helps that I have been a very passionate reader since I was an early child, and for the past 30 years have felt I have had a burning passion to write.

Q: What was that final or provoking thought that made you write your first book?

I had been off work long-term due to ill-health and was sitting feeling sorry for myself. When one day I sat up and said "No! I'm not going to do this, feel sorry for myself. I might as well use this time to write that book I have been putting off for so long!"

Q: How does writing bring out the best in you?

Writing has helped me look at myself and made me realize I can do something if I set my mind to it. Not to be afraid of taking a risk. It has helped me to be more observant of what is around me. Look more closely at how everybody interacts and notice the small things in life.

Q: Do you believe in awards or rewards?

Rewards. Writing is a gift and the best reward for a writer is knowing their book has been read and enjoyed. The only I would like is for one person to read and enjoy my story. If that does happen then I will be quite happy knowing for one brief moment I did something that was worthwhile.

Q: What is your favorite Quote?

One of my favorite quotes was by the late great Stan Lee – "To me, writing is fun. It doesn't matter what you're writing, as long as you can tell a story."–

As the great man once said - 'Nuf said true believer!

Q: How can you bring change to the literature world?

To be honest I am not sure I can! The one thing I have found since starting writing, for an independent author like myself it is hard work if you don't have somebody looking after your interests or help guide you. Maybe if enough voices spoke up, then perhaps it is possible to bring about a change.

Q: How does writing inspire you the most?

I have found writing has helped me to express myself in ways I have never thought possible. Since finishing my first novel, I have been inspired to write more, knowing I have it within myself to do it. I have realized anything is achievable if I put my mind to it.

Q: For you what is the meaning of being a writer?

Not only to be able to entertain but being able to write the words where a scene can fire a reader's imagination that will stay with them forever. For me it was James Herbert's The Rats, his vivid descriptions – especially in one particular memorable scene – will stay with me forever.

Q: How do you feel being an author?

It is indescribable! It is hard to put into words, after spending a lot of time and energy and then seeing my work in a physical form. To be honest I cannot help but get a sense of satisfaction when seeing my book on my bookcase and saying to myself "I did that!"

Q: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

Not setting yourself time each day to write. Creating your characters how you want to behave, rather than the way they should behave. Not reading enough, just because you are writing doesn't mean you should stop reading. Reading more helps broaden your vocabulary, which will make you a better writer.

Q: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?

I try to be original. If I deliver to readers what they want, then a story will become predictable and boring. Being unpredictable, you leave readers guessing, then they will want more and desperate to know what happens next.

Q: Do you think someone could be a writer if they don't feel emotions strongly?

I do not think that should stop someone from trying. If someone wants to become a writer then they shouldn't be put off not trying. Regret is one of life's most psychological barriers. If you try and fail, at least you won't look back with regret and say you didn't try.

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

When I first started my book, I was unsure how to begin so I researched and watch online tutorials on how to write a book, such as advice on character development and layout etc. Initially I spent a couple of hours a day over four days before I became confident enough to actually start writing.

Q: Do you have any upcoming books? What is it about?

I have just started work on the next novel in the series – Mirror Wars: Severed Dreams – which will follow directly on from Double Jeopardy, which I hope to release next year.

Q: How do you feel about your book being featured in DE MODE?

Quite excited at being given the opportunity to have my book featured in DE MODE Magazine.

INTERVIEW WITH AUTHOR helen garraway

Q: Is writing your passion or emotion?

I have become passionate about writing, as I love creating new worlds and the characters that live in them, but I began writing as a result of my darling mum passing away, a way to deal with my grief, and the time I suddenly had on my hands. I find writing therapeutic, emotional, and great joy.

Q: What was that final or provoking thought that made you write your first book?

I had been jotting down ideas for a book for many years; the ideas bubbling in the back of my brain. I just hadn't done anything with them. Then I began writing and the words flowed until I had written a book. It wasn't a conscious decision to write a book and publish it; it evolved more naturally.

Q: How does writing bring out the best in you?

Writing is a way of expressing yourself. I feel alive when I talk about my books, the characters, and anything else to do with them.

Q: Do you believe in awards or rewards?

Being an Independent Author, I don't necessarily find out about awards unless I spend a lot of time researching them. I have a full-time job and write in the evenings and weekends. I prefer to concentrate on the writing. My reward is seeing my books in print and readers enjoying them.

Q: What is your favorite Quote?

I like the saying that everyone has a book in you, and you're the one to tell it. Only you can write what you have inside you, it is very personal and unique to you. If you have the urge to write you should write. If you intend to publish you should learn your craft and do a good job of it. As Frank Harcourt said:

'Everyone has a story to tell. All you have to do is write it. But it's not that easy.'

Q: How can you bring change to the literature world?

As a fledgling author with two books under my belt, I doubt I will make much change in the literature world. I love to write. If my books entertain and bring enjoyment to others then that is change enough for me.

Q: How does writing inspire you the most?

I had to think long and hard about this question. Not an easy one to answer. I think writing inspires me to write more. The more I write, the more ideas I have bubbling away in the back of my brain waiting for me to bring them to the fore and put pen to paper. I wish I had more time to capture the ideas and give them justice, but they will have to wait their turn.

Q: For you what is the meaning of being a writer?

I write to entertain, to provide readers a moment of pure escapism. If I can help a reader experience a moment of joy, or intense emotions then that is success to me. The world is a difficult place to live in right now, and helping people cope or even escape from the pressures of their daily life is enough for me.

Q: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

A combination of self-doubt and being overwhelmed by the publishing process. Everyone doubts their book is good enough, but if you don't write it, you will never know. The important point is to write the book in the first place, and then invest in an editor to get it the best it can be. Worry about everything else later.

Q: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?

I try to be original, but to be honest I write what I enjoy reading. I am not a writer who can churn out a book every three months and write known tropes. I prefer to build a world and then populate it with some amazing characters and twisty adventures.

Q: Do you think someone could be a writer if they don't feel emotions strongly?

I suppose it depends on the type of book you are writing and what you are trying to achieve. If you are trying to evoke emotion in your readers then you need to understand how to trigger it. I often get into the heads of my characters and imagine how they react to a situation.

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

My research is more in the way of world-building. Developing the world, the culture, the politics so that my characters react to it consistently. Most research is into skills that are needed within these worlds, like types of swords and how to use them, or how to sail a boat, or how candles were made.

Q: Do you have any upcoming books? What is it about?

I am currently finalizing the edits for my third book, Sentinals Justice which will release on September 7th, 2021 and then I will begin editing the fourth book in the Sentinal series.

Q: How do you feel about your book being featured in DE MODE?





INTERVIEW WITH AUTHOR J. L. Engel

Q: Is writing your passion or emotion?

Writing is certainly a passion. When I write there's a story to tell, and that story has a life that flows through me. I see it as a movie in my head and present it in the narrative that it wants to be told. However, I also think that with it being a passion of mine, it acts as a vehicle of emotional expression. That's an ingredient that needs to be in the mix to not only ground what characters I want to bring to life but to allow the reader to connect with them and the story. Emotion is the glue that holds it all together.

Q: What was that final or provoking thought that made you write your first book?

The thought that led me to actually writing my first book was some advice given to me years later by an author who'd read an action/horror novella I'd written. After reading a piece of my work he told me, "The day you stop treating this like a hobby you'll be going somewhere. You're talented, and once you focus you'll be doing what you love."

Q: How does writing bring out the best in you?

Writing brings out the best in me because it allows me to do what I was meant to do. Finding and following your passion is something that escapes many people for many reasons, or excuses, whichever perception you decide to feed yourself. But I know that I am following mine when I write. It connects me to a deeper sense of myself, exploring and building and molding universes that exist within the well of my soul so I can fearlessly share them. That ability, or gift, makes me feel good and accomplished every time I put words on a page.

Q: How can you bring about a change in the literary world through your writing?

I don't know that I can, and I don't know that there's anything for me to change. I'm not writing to change anything in the literary world, per se. I'm writing to make a change in my world, in my life, and to impact the lives of others in a positive and meaningful way. Whether that's providing an escape from their daily grind, or opening their eyes to things they may have never considered before, that's what my writing will do.

Q: What is your favorite Quote?

It's from one of my favorite films, and it's my favorite quote because it's incredibly simple, yet incredibly deep and all-encompassing to the life we live.

"What we do in life echoes in eternity." – Maximus, Gladiator

Q: How does writing inspire you the most?

Writing inspires me to be committed; to achieve what I want to accomplish; to be disciplined; to be excited about the possibilities it can bring into my life. It's also inspiring

to me because, throughout the time I've been writing, I've seen the effect a story can have on the reader, running a gauntlet of emotions. That's powerful, encouraging, motivating, and because it's my role in this life to especially be a formidably good example to my child to reach for the stars, grab them, and realize that there's further to reach. I want to inspire that drive in her to follow her dreams and passions.

Q: How do you feel about being an author?

I'm excited about being an author. I have no delusions about it being an easy road to follow because it is not, nor that it will immediately become a career that can provide a comfortable life. It isn't. In time, whether it be a long or short duration, it will happen. I believe in myself as an author, and the world will too soon enough.

Q: Do you try to be original or to give the readers what they want?

I try to be original. In some ways, that's incredibly difficult because there are so many types of stories to be written and you have to put your spin on whatever kind you choose. As a writer, I believe you have to write what you would want to read and, with the size of the world, that means there will likely be many others who will enjoy it too.

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

Any research I do depends on what I'm writing, whether it is locations, a character occupation, or anything. The story will tell me where it wants to go and indicate what I may need to learn in order to paint the right picture. The imagery of it all is locked away in my head, so I have to paint that picture. If it's a technical detail it's all up in the air until I'm ready to cross the research bridge. And I don't necessarily research before I begin writing.

Q: Do you have any upcoming books? If so, what is it about?

My next book will be titled, "The Dock". That's probably the simplest title I've derived. A good title needs to grab you and something about it stuck with me. The story goes: Tensions rise and the blood boils when a crime family's "fixer" is backed into a corner by the return of a vengeful prodigal son and an unknown killer sent to reconcile a past transgression.


Q: How do you feel about your book being featured in DE MODE?

INTERVIEW WITH AUTHOR terri mitchell

Q: Is writing your passion or emotion?

Writing is a passion, fuelled by my emotions. I have always known that I could express myself far more confidently through the written word because there is time to think and to edit.

Q: What was that final or provoking thought that made you write your first book?

I wrote my first book based on the thought, "I can do better than this!" The thought germinated on the buses of Sydney when as a commuter traveling to and from work, I would ensure I had a book to read. With the love of many genres, I would find myself so disappointed with some books that had come from major publishing houses. I simply figured that if the publishing houses were prepared to print stories of such ordinary quality, I needed to write something so much better. So, I set about to write my first novel, and I am proud of the result.

Q: How does writing bring out the best in you?

I am able to express myself most articulately and with a joyous use of language that I may not use in everyday conversation

Q: Do you believe in awards or rewards?

I am not sure there is much of a difference. When I started my writing journey, I certainly didn't approach it with the view that I would receive any kind of nomination for a literary award. That said, I would not be disappointed to be nominated for one. However, I find the greatest reward is when someone has said they have purchased my book and enjoyed reading it. Even my own 75-year-old mother has been reading my novel, "Legacies" and is so enthusiastic about it that she believes I should write a sequel! Now, that is a reward!

Q: What is your favorite Quote?

"Be the inspiration to others. Remember, there are people who aspire to be just like you."

Q: How can you bring change to the literature world?

The best way to bring change to the world of literature is through education. Today's younger people are being exposed to a society where communication is being reduced to emojis and text abbreviations. Movies and videos have transcended books and writing, and for the world to grow and become less about the 'selfie' and more about the greater connection to the global community, education about the power of the written word and language needs to be encouraged.

Q: How does writing inspire you the most?

Writing is one of the greatest gifts of self-expression. Words hold power, and well-written words can move people. That is what inspires me most about writing.

Q: For you, what is the meaning of being a writer?

Writers have the unique position of being able to articulate and express what many people only wish they could, or what some people simply cannot. Being a writer is a state of being. I don't know how to BE anything else or any other way. It is how I identify myself. It is my being.

Q: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

The most common traps for aspiring writers are not believing in themselves, not taking the huge leap of faith to start, and falsely assuming that writing any kind of material such as a novel or nonfiction is easy. It is not easy, it requires a huge leap of faith, and it most definitely demands that you must, above all else, believe in your ability to write.

Q: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?

I aim to write original material to express what is in my head, heart, and soul. However, I also understand language enough to deliver readers the kind of material that makes for a more enjoyable or valuable read.

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

I tend not to research beforehand so much. I allow my imagination to flow and capture whatever emerges first. Then, I may research on the fly, as in, undertake necessary research as I need to, as might help me better express a point of view in my nonfiction, or to provide quality plotlines in my novels.

Q: Do you have any upcoming books?

I have several upcoming books. This year I released my first novel, 'Legacies' and this was followed quite quickly by my book about Fear and Confidence. Right now, I am finishing the first draft of my first novel in the Private Investigator / Crime genre, featuring the character Laura Power. It is my plan to write several books with Laura Power, Private Investigator as the central character. I am currently creating a collaborative book that will feature several of the guests I interviewed in my podcast where they will share their stories and missions in their own chapter. And, I have plans for other books, many of which will soon be available on my website as digital books.

Q: How do you feel about your book being featured in DE MODE?


I am excited to be sharing my work with an expanding audience and hope that I can inspire and motivate with my nonfiction and entertain and move people through my novels.

Jesse testifies for the defense, revealing the surprise killer, and Darnell is found not guilty. The final scene finds Damon in jail, stalking the man who attempted to kill his twin, revealing that it was he who killed Jesse's abuser and that his twin went to prison for him.

Q: Is writing your passion or emotion?

Q: How does writing inspire you the most?

ways I have never thought possible. Since finishing my first novel, I have been inspired to write more, knowing I have it within myself to do it. I have realized anything is achievable if I put my mind to it.

Q: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

I think aspiring writers tend to gauge their success in terms of recognition – getting an agent or getting published. Everyone should write because they enjoy it.

Q: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?

Ideally, I do both. The uniqueness of my fiction is its authenticity.

Q: What kind of research do you do?

I've accumulated a lot of knowledge over the years, but research definitely provides helpful supplements. I've researched causes of death, blood spatter evidence, and DNA findings.

Q: Do you have any upcoming book?

Yes. It's another Joe Turner Mystery called Blood Perfect. Due out next Spring.

INTERVIEW WITH AUTHOR gianna emiko barnes

Q: What was that final or provoking thought that made you write your first book?

If I'm being completely honest, I just needed an escape when I wrote the "Fallen" series. Hawaii was just shut down due to COVID and I had to navigate learning how to teach online while trying to write my Doctoral Dissertation. All the academic writing seemed to dictate my life and I just needed something else to get away. For me, writing has always been that escape and I threw myself into the fictional world I created for my characters. After a long day of strictly academics, I would spend my evenings developing my characters and the storyline and it just brought me peace during a time where I was overly stressed.

Q: How does writing bring out the best in you?

I have never been good verbalizing the thoughts that go through my head. I feel like writing brings out the best in me in the sense that it allows my creativity to flow without feeling as if I'm being judged or crazy for having all these fictional stories play out in my mind. It also helps me to destress and gives me breaks from reality when I desperately need it. Many times in my past, before I began writing the "Fallen" series, writing was my way of putting my feelings onto paper, in a safe space to vent, so that I could sort through everything and deal with my life from a more logical standpoint.

Q: How can you bring change to the literature world?

I feel like the literature world is ever changing. There are so many new and amazing authors out there that are still undiscovered. I'm still even finding new books, written by seasoned authors that I've fallen in love with. If there were to be one thing that I would hope to change, it's to bring voice to new authors in the literature world. Everyone has a story to tell and just because they're not known yet, doesn't mean their story is not worth reading. It would be an honor to one day be a well-known author, but until then it truly is difficult to get your work out there as a new author.

Q: What is your favorite Quote?

This year has been a rough one for me. I've lost countless family members and a dear friend to old age and sickness, on top of going through a divorce. As such, my favorite quote is actually a book title by Jennifer Proby, "Love Your Life." It's simple but so true.

Q: How does writing inspire you the most?

INTERVIEW WITH AUTHOR M. I. stark

Q: What was your first thought when you started writing and when?

For the past 3 decades, I desired to put down my few good and many evil memories of my actual events, into one book—from being born to becoming an adult woman. I have always written lots of notes, for me not to forget anything if I ever would write my autobiography. In 2016 I had the courage to grab pen and paper. However, I realized one book was not enough. I began all over again and divided the narrative into 4 parts of my life; being tangled into a toxic relationship, the younger adult life, marriage with sexual experiments, and my horrifying childhood living in different orphanages.

Q: What is the most unethical practice in the publishing industry?

When the publisher promises you the moon, stars, and perfect editing by native educated editors in Oxford English. English is my second language so too late—when the book was printed, I realized, they had tricked me. The books were edited by a bunch of editors with bad English skills. Publisher's breach of contract. Publishers who are not paying you back the money you paid for campaigns the publisher didn't fulfill in time. There are too many unethical self-publishing companies out there.

Q: Does writing energize or exhaust you?

It does both. The process of writing Burning Desire and Burning Desire Fades was a long 6-year process that at times energized me, drew out my energy until I exhausted fell asleep. Sometimes I wanted to give up, but giving up was not an option, and gave me back my energy to continue.

Q: Does a big ego help or hurt writers?

It depends on whether you have a good or a bad big ego. A bad ego is selfishness, egoism, and hurting others. A good ego is about you, me, and others, so it's not bad to have a big ego as it's essential for achieving peak performance. Personally, having a good ego was a sense of self-importance to get back my self-esteem, my optimism and to regain a healthy and normal good ego and life again, instead of being broken by an evil man. I'm sure it can help the writer if you stay true to yourself, also admit your mistakes, and not be selfish and egoistic.

Q: What is your writing Kryptonite?

Getting out the truth. Fighting for people's justice and for a good cause of getting out the important message; never allow anyone ever to abuse you—as I was. Always report your abuser—which I didn't. It is my life-long regret that I never reported my abusers.

Q: Have you ever gotten a reader's block?

Yes! Many times, and writers block as well.

Q: Did you ever consider writing under a pseudonym?

At first, I wanted to write under my authentic name. After long consideration, I decided to write under a pseudonym.

Q: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?

I'm only original! It might be my writing is different from other authors' styles and far away from the average of being a writer. The writing is as I've experienced it in my life—whether it's with my anger, sadness, love, and joy or with my humor and the traumas I went through in my life. I am who I am! I will not compromise with my factual story! Therefore, I will not pretend I am something else!

Q: What does literary success look like to you?

That I achieved to open Pandora's 'abusive' Box. To shed light and increase awareness on a tabued subject as psychological abuse is. Talking and giving more understanding about the blindness in the adoration of the many love-scammers, how the sociopaths use to mentally abuse others, as the line between love and manipulation, is anything but clear-cut. Many victims don't dare to talk about their abusive relationship, if more will dare to talk about it and they can understand from my story, then it is a literary success.

Q: How many unpublished and half-finished books do you have?

I am still in writing of books #3 and #4, where I shift between both, depending on the ideas popping up in my head and in which mood I am in at the time of writing.

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

My writing was heavily influenced by my first-hand experience dating a psychopath. Most research was during the 6 years I spend on developing the first book and the second round 6 months. Mostly Google search, scientific litterateur about psychopathic, sociopathic, and narcissistic behavior, along with criminal research, medical, and sexual information. I interviewed abused and love-scammed women, family, friends, patients, and people who were scammed by such an antagonist which I write about in my books. The research was a massive part of the creation process!

INTERVIEW WITH AUTHOR frantz charles

Q: Is writing your passion or emotion?

It's a passion of mine but it's a little of both. I love to write stories but when it comes to poetry my emotions take the lead. Emotions are essential when it comes to writing. In my opinion it's what's needed to bring words to life and how you flesh out your characters.

Q: What was that final or provoking thought that made you write your first book?

Honestly, I gave up on writing cause it took a lot of work to write those stories and I loved writing. If only it was possible." So I made my dreams a reality by pursuing the idea of making it a book.

Q: How does writing bring out the best in you?

writing gives me the opportunity to do what I love doing and that's mentoring and guiding people. For me I want to give my readers hope, teach them there's a way out, and leave valuable lessons for them. I love mentoring and helping people and doing so through my stories brings out the best out of me.

Q: Do you believe in awards or rewards?

I do very much. Life isn't easy and time waits on no one. So if stepping out in faith, being self discipline, consistent, and achieving your dreams had no rewards or awards then most people wouldn't do it or feel less motivated to do what they do. To achieve anything great, there needs to be a "why" that'll outweigh all the opposition. The why is the reward, but if there's no reward or award then people would give up. Something as basic as a 9-5 job the reward is a paycheck but if there was no pay (reward) then no one would work.

Q: What is your favorite Quote?

That's from the Bible.

"I truly believe if you believe in your idea and have faith that it'll come, with the hard work it shall come to pass."

My foundation is built on that quote and has gotten me far.

Q: How can you bring change to the literature world?

The right story with the right message that not just motivates but inspires the reader to do something brings about change. I believe if the right story does an internal transformation or the story changes someone's mindset whether it's fiction or non fiction the reader will do the marketing for you. I plan to change the literary world one

book at a time with the right story, message, and marketing team.

Q: How does writing inspire you the most?

The opportunity to have my writings worldwide and have people read what's been on my mind inspires me. Also, to teach people something new through my writing excites me.

Q: For you what is the meaning of being a writer?

The meaning of being a writer is having the freedom to spill what's on your mind, heart, soul onto paper through a pen, pencil, or computer. It's an art that expresses what a writer feels. Some people can't express or don't have someone to express vocally so they write things down. Being a writer is a deep skill and love I'll always appreciate.

Q: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

Procrastination, getting off track, seeking perfection, social media, and life. These are traps writers can tell you that got in the way. Aspiring writers see writing a novel as this big journey that takes time and gets discouraged but they need to take it one at a time.

Q: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?

I try to be original because the right audience will be attracted to what I like to write about. Also I'm not subjected to one genre, so I'm very diverse in what I write about that should tell you I'm very original. I tell stories I want to tell in hopes people will love it but if not, then oh well. I know I can't make every book lovable to people.

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

I spend a lot of time researching. I look into personalities, issues, what life for a person dealing with certain conflicts is like, I have to know the beginning and end of the story before writing, I look into design and costumes, and so much more. I have to know everything before starting so I don't keep going back and starting over. This also prevents plot holes. I write out general scenes chapter by chapter so everything flows then I write. It's a lot but it makes the writing easier.

Q: Do you have any upcoming books? What is it about?

It's TBA at the moment but I'm hoping for 2022-2023 for a release date. The next book is the prequel to the GCP which is about the characters' parents. It'll be a children's book.

Q: How do you feel about your book being featured in DE MODE?





INTERVIEW WITH AUTHOR tavi taylor black

Q: How do you feel being an author?

That's a bit of a strange question. Living as an artist is the only thing I know. Author, painter, dancer is how I selfidentify. If you mean "how does it feel to be a published author", it is, of course, an amazing feeling. To reach a life goal. Writing is so much different than other artistic pursuits. Anyone can create a painting, hang it on the wall, and have people interact and comment. But with writing novels in particular—you work on your craft mostly in isolation. I wrote two full novels before the majority of the people in my life read a word. So, it became awkward for people to ask, "how's the novel coming?" I didn't want to answer that question. I was working on it...and working on it...and working on it. Writers are just not considered legitimate authors until they have published work. So, yes, I guess you could say now I feel legitimate in the eyes of the public, though no more a writer than I was prepublication.

Q: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

I would say there are two major traps, the first being: not joining a writer's group. Other writers, particularly those who are well-matched to your skillset, can help you up to your game. You've got to find the right group and be comfortable taking critiques. Not everyone will understand your work. Not everyone will be gentle, but other eyes on your work is crucial. Revision is the majority of the work, so you have to be open.

The second mistake is that most writers give up too soon. Writing is work. You have to play for the long game. I'm convinced that it's all about numbers. Someone someday will connect with your work. They say it only takes one 'yes'. I agree.

Q: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?

Well, I don't really have a body of work out there yet, so up to this point, I only write what I'm inspired to write. I don't think that's likely to change. People have asked if I will write a sequel to Where Are We Tomorrow? I don't

have any plans to, but it's not out of the realm of possibility. I just have a lot of other books in the works right now.

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

I don't do research ahead of time. I write the story first because I'm of the belief that the story and the characters are what readers connect to. I finish a draft first, then I research. I read books about the time period, read other books in the genre for as long as I need to in order to feel comfortable digging back into the manuscript.

Q: Do you have any upcoming books? What is it about?

I do! I just signed another contract with TouchPoint Press for a historical novel called Serabelle.

During the Progressive Era in Bar Harbor, Maine, Mabel Rae has ambitions beyond her position as a chambermaid. At the Serabelle cottage where the wealthy come to play in 1913, Mabel, a girl burgeoning into womanhood, is impregnated by estate owner Alistair Hunt. She becomes entangled in a plot by Julia Ainsworth-Hunt to exact revenge on her husband by stealing his precious gem collection. At the height of the suffrage movement in New England, when women are striving for a voice and where temperance has taken an early hold, Mabel must discover where her loyalties lie and what freedoms she will eventually possess.

Q: How do you feel about your book being featured in DE MODE?

I am always thrilled to talk about my work and about writing in general. And it's exciting to be reaching a wider audience through such an elegant magazine. I hope that Where Are We Tomorrow will resonate with readers the world over.

Like many authors, Jim Toner enjoyed reading at an early age. He read his first Hardy Boys book at the age of eight and vowed to someday write a similar book. He started writing about the time he got too

INTERVIEW WITH AUTHOR jim toner

Q: Is writing your passion or emotion?

Writing is a passion. I feel an intense passion when writing for young adults, my target audience.

Q: What was that final or provoking thought that made you write your first book?

I wrote my first book as a way to describe some of my high school experiences. I was the squeaky clean Christian kid, while others in my school were into Satanic rock groups. Some of them shouted praises to Satan down the hallway of the school.

Q: How does writing bring out the best in you?

Writing brings out the best in me by allowing me to share some of my life experiences but in a fictionalized way. I like to give my readers the fictional dream by possibly allowing them to go places they couldn't otherwise go.

Q: Do you believe in awards or rewards?

Awards are nice to receive. Rewards for a writer are meeting people and signing books for people.

Q: What is your favorite Quote?

My favorite quote is

"Ne me demandez plus pourquoi j'aime la Touraine. Je l'aime comme un artiste aime l'art."

This is a quote by Honore De Balzac, my favorite author. As the great man once said - 'Nuf said true believer!

Q: How can you bring change to the literature world?

As for a change in the literature world, I know J.K. Rowling was a trendsetter as she was the forerunner of much young adult fiction. I am pleased to see so many young adult novels out there.

Q: How does writing inspire you the most?

Writing inspires me to improve as a person and ask questions of people. Writing is getting my stories out there and connecting with people.

Q: How do you feel being an author?

Being an author has added a dimension to my life. It has been a way to connect me with other authors and serves as a conversation piece when meeting people.

Q: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

Traps for being a writer include writing for trends. Trends are started in publishing houses about two years before the books arrive in the bookstores. Writers should write what they want to write.

Q: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?

I try to be original. Nobody can write the stories I write. Also, I can't write the stories other people write.

Q: Do you think someone could be a writer if they don't feel emotions strongly?

Someone could write nonfiction as in textbooks if they don't feel strong emotions. But when writing about people whether it is fiction or nonfiction, the reader needs to feel emotions.

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

Research depends on the subject. I tend to write more based on personal experience.

Q: Do you have any upcoming books? What is it about?

I am planning an upcoming book tentatively entitled Car Show Disappearance. The story takes place in Warren, Pennsylvania. Two men kidnap a teenage boy as he agrees to meet a friend at a car show.

Q: How do you feel about your book being featured in DE MODE?

CROWNOF CROWNS

Crown of Crowns is the first installment of a futuristic new YA saga by Clara Loveman, described as "sweeping, epic, and engrossing" with an "intriguing and twisting plot" that's perfect for fans of The Hunger Games and The Divergent Trilogy.

Booklife: Loveman's fast-paced young adult fantasy series, collected in an edition containing the first novel and its sequel, tells of a privileged teen whose eyes are opened to how the rest of the world lives: mostly in poverty. In a futuristic world where robots have taken most jobs and science has made most illnesses impossible, Kaelyn thinks everyone in the world is happy. She falls for Roki, who shows her that only a small handful of royal families are truly happy. After her mother is murdered and Roki disappears, Kaelyn must turn heartbreak into determination, first starting a foundation in her mother's name and then accepting that helping her people means marrying Prince Zawne and becoming king and queen. Then life gets complicated. (Readers eager to avoid spoiling the second book's premise should skip to the next paragraph.) After she's crowned, a deadly virus is released, and Kaelyn realizes that the only way to save her kingdom is to give up her own life and become a powerful spirit. Balancing actions with consequences, Loveman makes this apocalyptic story complicated in the right way, reminding readers that people will be complex no matter how advanced the society. After making an epochal choice at the end of the first book, Kaelyn discovers that nothing will be as simple as she had hoped—her choices now ripple across her world and even her galaxy. Rather than clear good or bad guys, this series concerns shades of humanity, driven by love and desires. She creates an intriguing new world with varied continents, seasons, clans, social classes, and advancements in technology. As the story grows, it expands to an entire detailed and fascinating galaxy of different worlds, creatures, and the city at the center of it all, where spirits come together to influence-good or bad-the rest of us. The choices characters make in the final pages will stir reader debate, but the journey is certainly worth it.

INTERVIEW WITH AUTHOR clara loveman

Q: How does writing bring out the best in you?

Weirdly, it's like gifting myself with something precious that has no appraisable value. I don't see it as a natural ability or talent that I own. Instead, my innermost being has an affinity to writing that it can't seem to shake. And when it's lent to me, it calms me, purifies me, and nourishes me. It's not spiritual. Let's just say it's fulfilling and redemptive.

Q: What was that final or provoking thought that made you write your first book?

It was an idea that intruded my thoughts, of spirits perniciously or innocuously controlling other people's thoughts, actions, and bodies. Human bodies gave spirits meaning. So, this notion of mysterious, invisible forces (good and bad) inhabiting human lives with potentially grave effects intrigued, captivated, and rattled me. I wrote an outline, a couple of thousand words, and off I went.

Q: Is writing your passion or emotion?

Writing is my passion, and I feel strongly that it's also my purpose. I lose track of time when I'm writing, almost as if nothing else matters, and it gives me an incredible sense of peace. At the same time, it's not the only thing I'd rather do; I need other activities to stir my muse.

Q: Do you believe in awards or rewards?

Awards or rewards can be important, as they serve as a yardstick of human potential and integrity. But we are more than awards, and people who deserve them the most may not receive that recognition. For these reasons, awards, or lack thereof, shouldn't define us.

Q: What is your favorite Quote?

I have several, but at this moment, James Baldwin comes to mind.

"Perhaps the turning point in one's life is realizing that to be treated like a victim is not necessary to become one."

Also

"If you really want to know something about solitude, become famous."

Q: How can you bring change to the literature world?

I want fiction to be more accessible as it's not only a pleasurable experience, but it can also change the lens through which one sees the world. The key for me is helping people find the book that turns them into readers. My contribution aims for simplicity in my writing, at then at the publication stage for availability in most formats and wide distribution. I want to do more than this.

Q: For you, what is the meaning of being a

writer?

It is to articulate the minute, delicate moments in life that we're too rushed to stop and acknowledge. Our private thoughts, agitations, observations, descriptions, sentiments, stories, morality, pain, love, human nature, and nature.

Q: How do you feel about being an author?

It's a blessing, but it's also nerve-racking because publishing puts your work out there, and it probably won't be everyone's cup of tea. This is something I have to accept and then plow on.

Q: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

Procrastination and self-doubt rank up there! Also, use family and friends as beta-readers and constantly talking to them about your writing.

Q: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?

A bit of both, but mostly I try to be original.

Q: Do you think someone could be a writer if they don't feel emotions strongly?

Absolutely! There is an inbuilt advantage to having experienced something, but I don't think it's a prerequisite.

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

I research all sorts of things, including names, places, and the origin of numerous words. The amount of time I spend researching depends on what I'm writing. I'm currently writing a novel that requires more research than I've done in the past because one of the characters has a severe medical condition.

Q: How do you feel about your book being featured in DE MODE?

I'm extremely grateful for the opportunity. It's an honour. Thank you so much.



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INTERVIEW WITH AUTHOR david rohlfing

Q: Is writing your passion or emotion?

You can invoke emotion from readers in what you write, but I write because I enjoy writing, so it is a passion.

Q: What was that final or provoking thought that made you write your first book?

I've been a reader of murder mysteries featuring police detectives or investigators for many years. However, most authors feature characters who reside in large metroplexes on the east or west coast of the United States, so I wanted to feature a protagonist from a small city in the Midwest. In developing the lead character of the Detective Sasha Frank Mystery Series, it was essential to make him a person who fought to find justice for his victims and their families. Sasha leaves no stone unturned to find those responsible for the murders that take place.

Q: How does writing bring out the best in you?

Finding justice for victims of crimes or discrimination is a character trait that I am passionate about. Murder mystery readers, I believe, have the same desire to find justice for those victimized, so ensuring that perpetrators pay for their misdeeds reinforces that belief.

Q: Do you believe in awards or rewards?

Certainly rewards. Awards can undoubtedly be rewarding to those who receive them, but my reward is in readers finding my books complex and thought-provoking. I hope that readers think of themselves as partners working beside Sasha Frank, helping him to solve murders as he pursues evidence to find justice.

Q: What is your favorite Quote?

One of my favorites is from Ralph Waldo Emerson -

"Life is a succession of lessons which must be lived to be understood." I've certainly made countless mistakes in my life, and I can only hope that I learned from them. While in business, I liked the anonymous quote, "Delegate authority ruthlessly with confidence." In most endeavors, it takes a team to accomplish big goals, and the only way for a team to achieve is for all to learn to do.

Q: How can you bring change to the literature world?

The one way that I can help is to make sure that the characters I develop reinforce that good wins out over evil. Having characters who promote what society as a whole sees as traits that bring out the best in people who find justice against the evil characters who cause havoc in my books is important to me.

Q: How does writing inspire you the most?

By writing about good triumphing over evil, I hope that I bring a message that the guilty ultimately will pay and aren't allowed to escape the justice they deserve. The

good people do around the world far outweighs the bad, but the bad tends to get highlighted most often.

Q: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?

Originality is what's most important to me. When family and friends read my books, they look at me differently now and ask where the darkness I write about comes from as I develop what I think are innovative ways to commit murders. Writing murder mysteries with new twists is fun, and I hope readers find them equally entertaining.

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

The books I write are part of a series and feature a recurring main character and a few support characters that work alongside him. When I sit down to write, I only have a general plot for the book and an initial victim and antagonist. In the beginning, I don't have an outline or fully developed new characters. As I write, I continuously build the story and add characters to build the suspense to its ultimate conclusion.

Q: Do you have any upcoming books? What is it about?

The first book in the Detective Sasha Frank Mystery Series was "Deliberate Duplicity" released early this year, followed by the recent release of the second book "Cold Consequences." 

Q: What was that final or provoking thought that made you write your first book?

I wrote my first book for the LGBTQ community and women coming out! The thought that provoked me to write my first book was the belief that through my writing I will be able to help others Rise.

Q: How does writing bring out the best in you?

My soul is filled when I write. I am grateful for every precious moment my writing journey offers me. It allows me to see the miracle in each experience.

Q: Do you believe in awards or rewards?

Rewards grateful to write. The reward for work well done is the opportunity to do more. Faith is to believe what you do not see; the reward of this faith is to see what you believe. The most difficult thing is the decision to act, the rest is merely tenacity.

By writing my heart and being authentic. Authenticity is everything! The keys to brand success are self-definition, transparency, authenticity, and accountability. Details matter. That inner voice has both gentleness and clarity. Truth is a point of view, but authenticity can't be faked.

Q: How do you feel about being an author?

It means being vulnerable to others. For me, being vulnerable means sharing your own feelings openly, bravely, but also having the guts to allow the other person to go at their own pace, even if you are anxious for them to move quicker. It means being patient, trusting, allowing the other their own experience.

Q: For you what is the meaning of being a writer?

I love being an author. I love the challenge of bringing a book to life, of creating something from nothing other than my thoughts. I love getting a more organized mind, the diverse creativity that writing brings out in me, the constant learning, and most especially, the camaraderie.

Q: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

Don't focus on it being perfect. Trying to be perfect is something a lot of people have tried, but none have succeeded. It's impossible to be perfect, no matter how hard you try. What typically happens is someone pushes themselves so hard because they want to be good at writing, that eventually it turns into more of an obsession with being flawless. You're aiming to be perfect without even realizing it.

Q: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?

I write original works from my life experiences. Readers want something that's real. They want to live in your book. They want to become your characters and feel every joy & heartache right along with them. They want to see, smell, hear, feel taste. It's one thing to create a story. But if you're using your life, your experiences, and your personality, then you have all the material before you even start.

Q: Do you think someone could be a writer if they don't feel emotions strongly?

Anyone can write, you do need some depth. Let pieces of your life interweave themselves into your book, along with completely made-up parts. It's a more flexible option than writing your life story. You can edit out the parts you don't like and add plot twists you think would make it better. It keeps that realistic feeling.

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

I don't research subjects.

Q: Do you have an upcoming books? What is it about?

My upcoming books are 'Full Bloom' and 'Awaken Me' a sequel to The Lesbian Whisperer in my trilogy.

Q: How do you feel about your book being featured in DE MODE?

DOOM OF STARS

"Doom of Stars" attempts to marry two types of fiction: firstly a character-driven story, where the reader is hopefully drawn into empathizing with the main characters and their struggles against seemingly impossible odds.

The story is woman-centered with two main female protagonists: Kalli, a teenager, and her grandmother, Tamara Adekola. The two women never meet but the actions of the grandmother impinge strongly on Kalli's life story. Both women are of African-American extraction.

The story opens upon the vista of a ruined Earth. The planet has become subject to great climatic changes and has winters in which most of the Northern Hemisphere is ice-bound in winter and dangerously hot in winter. Consequently, the capital of the North American Federation alternates between Florida in the winter and Canada in the summer.

We meet Kalli as an undervalued, almost despised, member of an impoverished community living on the edge of the sea somewhere near London, England. It seems the Ice Age has returned. Kalli is a loner, both for the color of her skin, and her rather questioning nature. She thinks she understands what had happened to the world but cannot convince anyone to listen to her. Her preoccupation with deep issues leads to her causing two hunting expeditions to fail and as a punishment, all her treasured mementos from the mother who abandoned her are destroyed. However, she manages to hide the most valuable treasure—a mysterious silvery ball, which seems to react to her presence. However, life takes an unwanted turn when she accompanies the tribe to the snowy ruins of London. There she meets a man who claims to be her father and can provide Kalli with details about her family history. But his news is very unwelcome because it seems that her grandmother was a scientist who brought about the climate disaster through a failed experiment.

THE JOURNEY OF AUTHOR MARTYN RHYS VAUGHAN

Martyn Rhys Vaughan was born in the World Heritage town of Blaenavon in the green valleys of South Wales, a town where the first steps in the Industrial Revolution were taken and which has the best-preserved early



ironworks in Europe.

From an early age he was always interested in writing and storytelling, and was particularly drawn to the writers of the "Golden Age of Science Fiction." as his heroes - people like Ursula K. Le Guin, Isaac Asimov, Ray Bradbury and many others. He was enthralled by their visions of worlds so different to the ordinary. However, he noticed

how many of the writers warned of trouble if science was misused and that struck a chord with him. He loved the work of H. Rider Haggard, with exciting adventures in unexplored Africa. He longed to write fantastic adventures and baffling

mysteries like his heroes. He did reasonably well at school but found it hard to find a career that satisfied him. Martyn tried his hand at a variety of jobs including working in agriculture, where one of his most amusing memories was of chasing an escaped piglet down a country lane. After that, his scientific education led him to work in an industry in a variety of jobs in chemical

Marriage and fatherhood made him realize that he needed to settle down, and he used his mathematical skills by working for the British Government in the area of measuring the economy.

After leaving the work, he finally had the time to see what he could do in the world of fiction and published his first novel - "Quantum Exile." This story combined his two passions of concern for the environment and the use of science for the benefit of humanity. It tells the story of a man who finds himself thrown into an alternative reality, where climate change has run riot and large parts of the world are uninhabitable through heatwaves and rising sea levels. At the time, it seemed very speculative but recent events have shown such an outcome is all too likely.

INTERVIEW WITH AUTHOR martyn rhys vaughan

Q: Is writing your passion or emotion?

Both, but mainly a passion. I've always wanted to write from an extremely young age and found the creative-writing part of my education the most engaging. The desire to tell stories about human relationships and the exploits of great heroes is one embedded in the human condition. Dwellers in the caves would have told each tale on winter nights.

Q: What was that final or provoking thought that made you write your first book?

Although I am primarily a storyteller, I have always had an interest in the environment. There can be no doubt that humans are trashing the natural world in the pursuit of short-term gain. Recent events show the world is heading for disaster. We are losing entire species of both animals and plants. So my first book focused on climate change.

Q: How does writing bring out the best in you?

I would like to think that it allows me a platform in which I can both entertain people and at the same time make them aware of the threats that we are facing. For this reason, my books always have a scientific angle to them. However, the best way I can do this is by seizing the reader's attention.

Q: Do you believe in awards or rewards?

As a writer, I believe that awards would be very gratifying, as it would indicate that I have made a difference. As for rewards, the only ones I really want is to know that people are buying my books and enjoying them. That would be enough.

Q: What is your favorite Quote?

"If Winter comes, can Spring be far behind?" -Percy Bysshe Shelley.

Q: How can you bring change to the literature world?

By demonstrating that we have only one planet and if we trash this one we're toast. The problems come from the short-termism of some economic models and discounting of future problems. The problem is with maintaining the lifestyles of rich countries in a world of diminishing resources. This can be done by using science as a servant, not a master.

Q: How does writing inspire you the most?

By knowing I have engaged the reader and given him or her a rewarding experience by taking them out of themselves into an invented world of mine, which they find entertaining and enthralling. I do not believe in lecturing people or bombarding them with facts but only telling a good story.

Q: For you what is the meaning of being a writer?

Being a good writer means creating believable characters that act and sound like real people. This is the primary definition of being a good writer. The second aspect is taking the believable characters that you have created and putting them in situations where the reader cares about what happens to them.

Q: How do you feel about being an author?

I simply want to entertain and enthrall the reader. Any lessons learned from reading books are secondary. I want the reader to believe in the characters and be fascinated by their struggle. I believe that all enthralling tales involve some kind of struggle. The characters do not have to be good – just interesting.

Q: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

The most common trap is a lack of imagination and spending pages basically talking about oneself. Unless your own story is particularly enthralling—and who is the judge of that?—the author must go beyond his or her personal experiences. Another error is to try too hard to be "literary"—the story and the characters are what matter.

Q: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?

I try to do both. The most important thing is to deliver to the readership what they can justifiably expect from the type of novel they have chosen to read. The difficult balancing act is to do that originally and still maintain their interest. But to do both is very satisfying.

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

Because my books always have a scientific aspect to them, research is extremely important. An error in basic scientific matters would be very embarrassing and would cause the reader to lose confidence in my message. As a consequence, I do not start writing until I have done about a month's work of research, from as many sources as are practicable.

Q: Do you have any upcoming books? What is it about?

I have two forthcoming titles. The first is a collection of short stories and one novella. The stories have a mild horror flavor to them: DEVOURING DARKNESS —Out on August 26th. The second is a novel and is the sequel to my novel about a climate disaster: RESOLUTION OF STARS—out in the autumn of 2021.

Q: How do you feel about your book being featured in DE MODE?

I feel gratified and honored and hope it will encourage people to see what I have offer.

INTERVIEW WITH AUTHOR margreit maitland

Q: Is writing your passion or emotion?

Q: How does writing bring out the best in you?

It allows me to be creative and that is cathartic and brings me a great deal of personal satisfaction. This, in turn, raises my confidence and feelings of accomplishment.

Q: Do you believe in awards or rewards?

I do, and I believe people should earn them. Although, I think there are many talented people in all professions who go "unrecognized" and don't win trophies or awards, and that doesn't change or take anything from their valuable contributions. Winning an award for me would provide an opportunity to spread an inspiring message.

Q: What is your favorite Quote?

"Tomorrow is another day." From Scarlett in "Gone With the Wind", my favorite book.

Q: How can you bring change to the literature world?

I would say the best way for me to contribute is to share what I've learned and try to inspire young readers and writers to use their imaginations. I developed a workshop for kids for school and library visits and collaborated on a Creative Writing Bootcamp for adults. The teaching aspect of my writing life is a happy accident, which I love.

Q: How does writing inspire you the most?

It has helped build my confidence and that sends waves of energy through my life which brings about more inspiration. Q: For you what is the meaning of being a writer?

Q: How do you feel about being an author?

I feel proud of what I've accomplished and am so excited to release my second novel. I love to hear feedback from readers!

Q: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

Being trapped in an endless editing loop. At some point you just have to say, it is DONE!

Q: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?

I am writing Robert's story which is original. I try to make it as accurate as I can and include lots of imagery so readers feel like they are part of what is happening. I can only hope that is what readers want.

Q: Do you think someone could be a writer if they don't feel emotions strongly?

I am not sure how to convey a character's feelings, growth and interactions without feeling strong emotions myself. So for me, the emotional piece to character building is key.

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

Because I am doing a historical fiction series, I do an extensive amount of research. I really believe in being as accurate as I can be in settings and events. I do everything from reading personal journals from the Age of Sail to interviews, reading books, and watching movies for visual references.

Q: Do you have any upcoming books? What is it about?

I just released my second novel in the series, "Adventurer at Sea" and I am starting the third and final book now. I am hoping it can be released by year-end, but we will see when I finish it. The entire series is based on the true story of my great, great grandfather. He ran away from home in the mid-1800s to escape abuse, and it set him on a trek around the world quite by accident. He had all kinds of adventures that are quite unbelievable. It is an amazing story to have the privilege to tell.



INTERVIEW WITH AUTHOR adam ostaszewski

Q: Is writing your passion or emotion?

Writing is my passion, but of course, I have lots of emotions in creating new stories. I love to create a new world, new heroes, new communities. In every story, in every book, I choose one hero which is I think my alter ego. I love to guide him or her through my imagination. And I never know how his era her way will end. It deepens my emotions.

Q: What was that final or provoking thought that made you write your first book?

My first short story I wrote when I was 9 years old. It was short criminal story with brave police officer. I even made some pictures to story. But seriously I was writing lots of short stories through almost 20 years. Two of them, "Reflection" and "Ares Mission" stories were recognized at the 1st and 2nd Clarke-Bradbury International Science Fiction Competition and published in English as part of collections of prize-winning works. I decided to publish them now, I think because of pandemic. We all saw that nothing is stable and we must be most brave.

Q: How does writing bring out the best in you?

I can walk in their shoes and imagine what could you do if you were them.

Q: How do you feel about being an author?

Q: What are common traps for aspiring writers?

I think aspiring writers must write, write and write. You must try to reveal your imagination. And do not surrender if you think that your novels are bad. One you write better one worse. It is normal. And do not write only for money. If you lose your imagination for accidental applause, it will be the end of your writer's journey. Be yourself and write what your imagination tells you.

Q: Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?


A writer has to be himself and write what he feels or imagines. I try to do that. 
Q: How do you feel about your book being featured in DE MODE?

INTERVIEW WITH AUTHOR reena korde pagnoni

Q: What do you love most about writing stories for children?

I love being able to share my stories with children and watch the books come to life through their eyes. Observing the way children make a connection with the characters is really special. I hope The Rambee Boo Series can provide useful tools for healthy social and emotional growth.

Q: Have you always wanted to be a writer? What inspired you to become a children's author?

Although I have always loved children's books, I never thought I would write one. Last year, at the beginning of the pandemic, we added a new puppy (Rambo aka Rambee Boo) to our family, and I saw a sweet relationship blossom between Rambee and my youngest son Rock (Rocky). When I started searching my library for books about children and their pets, I realized there were not a lot of options in the realistic fiction genre, so I decided to write my own.

Q: Do you like to create books for adults too?

Since my books are primarily read in read-aloud style, it is very important to me that adults enjoy my stories just as much as children do. The repetition and rhyming allow children to follow along and participate in the read-aloud, making it a positive interactive experience for all.

Q: What topics do your stories cover and why are these important to you? How do you come up with the titles to your books?

Each Rambee Boo book focuses on one of five themes: Patience, Anxiety associated with new experiences, Responsibility, Problem Solving, and Working Together. These themes play a vital role in the healthy growth and development of young children. Giving children positive role models who are modeling good behavior is important as children learn through imitation. These five themes resonate well with our readers since many of them are exploring similar situations in their own social interactions.

Q: How can you bring change to the literature world?

The Rambee Boo Series vows to never tell children how to think, feel or act. Instead, we want to provide children with positive characters and show them how our characters deal with a situation. We hope this will give our readers the tools they need to apply these concepts to their own lives.

Why do you think it is important for children to develop a love of reading? What is your favorite children's book?

There are so many benefits of reading to children and

fostering the love of books. Reading helps brain development, concentration, focus, communication skills as well as develop early literary skills such as learning sounds, words, and language. Books stimulate children's creativity and imagination. The Rambee Boo Series works hard to give children enjoyable read-aloud stories that they are excited to engage with. This takes the chore out of reading and makes it a fun experience. My favorite children's books are Little Critter by Mercery Mayer.

Q: What was one of the most surprising things you learned in creating your books?

Just how powerful a character can be in a child's life.

Q: Do you have a favorite character that you have written? If so, who? And what makes them so special.

I love all three of our main characters, all for different reasons. I love Rock because he's sweet and models good behaviors. I love Rambee Boo because...well who doesn't love an adorable puppy, and I love Sock because he provides Rambee Boo with comfort. Many children have a comfort toy, so they can relate to how important Sock is to Rambee Boo.

Q: What is the key theme and/or message in the book?

The main message in Meet Rambee Boo! Is patience. Waiting is hard but it's something we all experience. It's important to teach children to find adventure on any ordinary day. Not all weeks are super fun and that's okay. In Meet Rambee Boo! Rock can't wait to go to the beach on Saturday. The book shares the everyday errands that Rock and Rambee Boo run with their parents during the week.

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

That really depends on the book. Most of my books do not require extensive research, however, I do like to pass along my ideas to a focus group of about 10 children (including my own) to see how they receive the idea. I want the characters to resonate with the reader, so it's always helpful to get feedback from other children in my target audience's age group.

Brian grew up in Northern Ireland, during "the Troubles" and went to a posh school where CS Lewis was once a pupil and Samuel Beckett briefly taught. Brian made the sports pages as a champion

swimmer, traveling widely and representing Ireland as well as being a serial holder of records. He says he may have been more dedicated to training than to his studies at times. After school, he studied for a Law degree at Southampton University, before taking a Master's in Law at

Queen's University, while he enjoyed all that student life had to offer. A legal career beckoned, of course, and he pursued it, but it turned out that Brian liked being a writer more than being a lawyer. Whether the story is about embracing enthusiasm and good cheer or finding gratitude in the little things, Brian's characters are blessed with good fortune. In Brian's picture book, Siggy Loves Sausages, the magical little dog Siggy is rewarded for his positivity—with sausage, of course! His philosophy is that a great book shares the beauty in everyday life. His relatability to children is evident. Real events and local children delivering little bouquets to their neighbors inspired The Phabulous Phlower Phaeries, his forthcoming book for older children. Brian hopes that his stories provide happiness and enjoyment to his young readers. When he isn't writing imaginative life lessons for children—whilst listening to loud indie rock music on headphones—Brian enjoys following Manchester United Football Club and taking country walks with his wife, Harvinder (whose family hail from Punjab, India). Together they live in a small nature reserve, where their house is alive with birdsong and woodland critters run around the trees like a fairytale forest. INTERVIEW WITH AUTHOR brian frederick

Q: What do you love most about writing stories for children?

Most of all I love thinking back to when I was a child myself and the wonderful, warm and cozy feeling I would get when I wrapped myself up in the world created by books. That's what I want to create for kids with my stories.

Q: Have you always wanted to be a writer? What inspired you to become a children's author?

I trained to be a lawyer, and I've owned several businesses as well as a law firm, but they never brought me joy as writing does. Being a writer feeds my own soul and helps me bring kindness into the world. Being a lawyer never did that.

Q: Do you like to create books for adults too?

When I began to write, about 25 years ago in London, I was writing for adults. I thought I wanted to become part of the smart literary set. I nearly became successful, but I'm glad it didn't happen for me then because writing for children brings me much more satisfaction than the world of the "literary salon" ever could.

Q: What topics do your stories cover and why are these important to you?

I want to entertain my children. If I don't do that, then they won't want to read the gentle life lessons and philosophy that I want to impart to them in my stories. I want them to absorb what I'm telling them so in a small way maybe I can help them to grow up to be really good, kind, and gentle people.

Q: How do you come up with the titles to your books?

Often the titles come before the rest of the story does. Other times, there's a working title and then the real title makes itself known. That often happens in the dead of night when my subconscious summons me to sit bolt upright and scramble for a pen to capture the idea.

Q: How can you bring change to the literature world?

In a very small, humble corner of the literary world, I hope I can set out my little table and decorate it with truth, with entertainment, and with empathy. I hope these beautiful things make that little table look inviting enough for children to sit down and hear more.

Q: Why do you think it is important for children to develop a love of reading?

Frederick Douglass said: "Once you learn to read you will be forever free." Books can take a child anywhere, and let them imagine doing anything. I think it's perhaps more important in our modern, transient world than ever before that children learn to love reading.

Q: What is your favorite children's book?

There's a cornucopia of brilliant books. Perhaps my own absolute favorite is The Lion, The Witch and The Wardrobe by CS Lewis. I'd die happy if I had a book like that to leave as my legacy.

Q: What was one of the most surprising things you learned in creating your books?

Aspiring writers probably don't know how much there is to do after the writing is done - until they take the journey to the end. The words on the page are always the most important thing, but for them to appear there for readers to enjoy means walking a long and difficult path.

Q: What is the key theme and/or message in the book?

My books are about compassion, kindness and creating a sense of wonderment. At the heart of every story, those things are the core. In the end, we need our children to make a better world than we have done, and I hope in some small way to help them.

Q: Do you have a favorite character that you have written? If so, who? And what makes them so special.

My little heroine Phyllis and her sweet sausage dog, Siggy are my favorite characters. Phyllis is fictional but she's made up of all the good things I see in the children I meet. Siggy is like her animal extension. He's an irrepressible force for positivity.

Q: What were the key challenges you faced when writing this book?

Real events impinge on a writer. You are creating a world inside your head that needs to escape onto the page. When the world is filled with disaster, sorrow, and lies it can be challenging to imagine that better world you're seeking for your stories.

Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

That depends on the book. Some books are written from my own experience, some almost completely from the imagination. Others do require research. It's always important to get the details and the tone just right. Children are discerning. They can spot a fake.

Q: How do you feel about your book being featured in DE MODE?

I'm excited - and, yes, honored - to be featured in such a prestigious publication as one of the best new children's authors. I'd love to think that parents will read this feature and that in turn their kids will read and love my books. That's what it's all about!



INTERVIEW WITH AUTHOR eboniè p. fields

Q: What do you love most about writing stories for children?

What I love most about writing stories for children is the opportunity to take children away on an adventure through my magical stories, allowing them to be in a space of fantasy and joy. I love writing and the activity of creatively putting my thoughts and imagination on paper for children to read.

Q: Have you always wanted to be a writer? What inspired you to become a children's author?

One day after my husband and I decided that we wanted to start a family, I went to Barnes & Noble to buy books on facts and helpful tips on becoming parents. As I was walking through the store, I walked over to the children's book section. There on that day, I realized that there was a significant lack of books with characters of color in bookstores. I went home and discussed my observation with my husband. He said, "You love to write. Write a children's book." That summer I began writing my first children's book, Zenie and the Magical Hummingbirds. In December of 2020, I released my second book, Zoey and the Magical Hummingbirds.

Q: Do you like to create books for adults too?

I currently have a few ideas and rough drafts for a couple of adult books. However, I truly enjoy being a children's book author and the joy that I bring to children with my creative stories.

Q: How can you bring change to the literature world?

I think it is important that all children can select from a diverse collection of books. I'm bringing change into the literature world by creating stories with a positive message that all children can read, especially children of color. It is important that all children can see themselves, their families, friends, and neighbors in the books that they read.

Q: How do you come up with the titles to your books?

I easily come up with the titles of my books by just naming the main characters and the magical hummingbirds. My titles speak for themselves on what the story is going to be about. However, I like to make my titles enticing for children to want to read them, as well as easy for them to remember.

Q: Why do you think it is important for children to develop a love of reading?

Children must develop a love of reading to excel in literacy and academics. The more a child reads, the more educated they will become about certain topics, as well as develop better creative writing and reading skills.

Q: What is the key theme and/or message in the book?

Through the magical adventures in my books, children learn about the importance of cherishing their loving families, homes, and the importance of sharing with those less fortunate. It's important to remind children how blessed they are and how they can help others in need.

Q: Do you have a favorite character that you have written? If so, who? And what makes them so special.

My favorite characters in my books are my Magical Hummingbirds. I created my Magical Hummingbirds with my two Grandmothers in mind. I have been very blessed to have two amazing Grandmothers who are always dear and special to my heart.

Q: What were the key challenges you faced when writing this book?

The challenges I faced were overcoming naysayers and my own fear of publishing a book. While publishing my book, I recognized the fact that there have been thousands of authors who have experienced the same fears and negative feedback; and they overcame them. Q: What kind of research do you do, and how long do you spend researching before beginning a book?

My stories are fictitious tales, but I do like to throw in a few educational facts about the island of Jamaica for children to learn. I just do a couple of days of research to double-check my facts.

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
